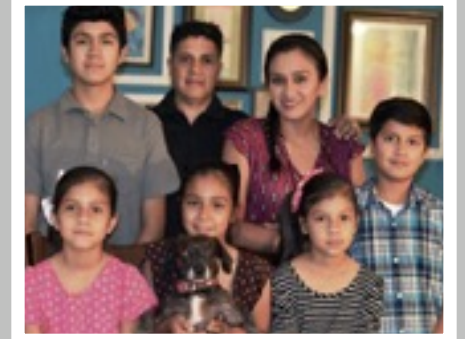
# Building Something Beautiful Together

FamilyPoint has grown around the idea that needs are best met, and lives are changed, through relationships. Central to this idea is the belief that God has created us all to live in community. In community we celebrate everyone's uniqueness, both strengths and weaknesses; we acknowledge our own personal poverty and need for the people around us as we help to meet the needs of others; and we become free to truly know the depth of God's love because we see the beautiful mosaic of pieces fitting together to make a whole much greater than any one part on its own. It is with this undergirding belief that we say ***FamilyPoint Resources is committed to empowering children and families in our community to overcome cycles of poverty, and to bringing people together from all sides of our community to build a stronger and more enriched neighborhood.***

Since our first programs began in 2007, FamilyPoint has sought to grow as a part of our community, taking shape to meet needs as they are presented to us, and as our capacity allows. During the 2014-2015 school year, we began to more deeply explore the power of place. Relationships and community can grow around a place; we gather, we share, we connect, we grow, all around places. Just as programs can be a powerful tool in connecting people to relationships and meeting needs, a place can help to create belonging and facilitate the sharing of resources. During this year we have seen our space blossom into more than it has ever been before. The community center has become just that, a center in the community, a hub. In helping this happen, people from all sides of our community joined in Building Something Beautiful Together.

## Library, Education, & Arts

The Nottingham Park Community Library has grown to be a central part of what we do at FamilyPoint as it has developed into a community hub. Each day after school the library fills with students (ranging from Pre-K through High School), parents, and volunteers. While it is a place to access resources, to get help on homework, and to have fun, it is also much more. The NPC Library has become a gathering place where sides of our community that all too often keep to themselves find common ground and begin to share life. It is a place to connect with the diversity in our community. A place of trust, value, safety, learning, hope, imagination, collaboration, and friendships.

The Library is not only a hub for our community, but it has also become a hub for FamilyPoint's Education and Arts Programs. This year our Homework Help Program moved to the Library, allowing us to better utilize resources and create a more productive environment for students to learn and have fun. The Library hosts art, theatre, dance, and karate classes for students. Professional tutors meet with students in the library. And last year the library began hosting dance classes for parents, and in partnership with Crosswalk Houston began hosting family fun and parent support events.

## Also in 2014-2015...

Two art projects (a mural and totem poles) transformed the Library into a Community Art Space.

Sixteen students participated in a Kindergarten Reading Program at Thornwood, working with volunteers twice a week on early literacy skills.

A new Middle School/High School room opened at the Library.

Middle School and High School students learned the ins and outs of the Coffee business from growers, roasters, and others in the industry.

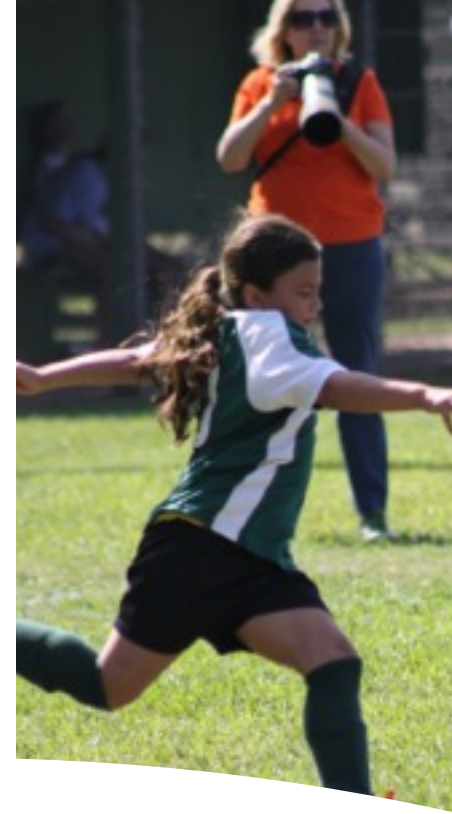

## JACOBI & TOBY

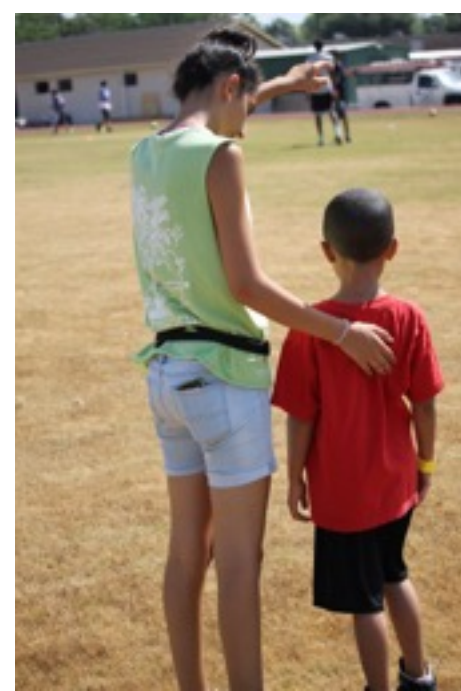
After learning about Jacobi's passion for soccer at last year's FamilyPoint Breakfast, Toby Whitby reached out to Jacobi and began building a relationship.

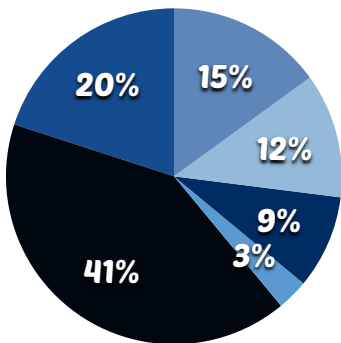
# Support

**2014 Total Expense** \$438,810

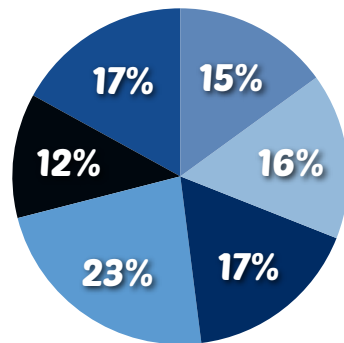
**2014 Total Income** \$350,936
