Health and Fitness have always been an important part of what we do at FamilyPoint, stretching back to our first programs in 2007.

The 2015-2016 school year saw students continue to connect into life changing relationships with caring adults through Baseball, Basketball, Soccer, Volleyball, Karate, and our growing FPR Speed programs. FPR Speed's Track and Cross Country programs blossomed this year into amazing tools to engage families on all sides of our community, while helping athletes develop and have fun. Sports provide a great opportunity for students to build deep relationships, build confidence and discipline, and provides a much needed relief from toxic stress. Health & Fitness is more than sports participation. We also create opportunities for students to be active on a daily basis, provide nutrition programs and mental health resources for families in our community.

ARTS & EDUCATION

Academic support and creating opportunities for students to build skills and explore talents through arts programs is essential to helping students see themselves in new ways. As skills, talents, and relationships develop, a child's perspective of themselves and their future can begin to change. This change often carries over into the classroom and other social settings, allowing students who had given up on themselves to see they can achieve more in their lives and contribute more to their community than they dreamed was possible.

FamilyPoint supports students in Kindergarten through to High School Seniors in Homework Help at the NPCL. Everyday we have volunteers helping students with academic skills. Students are also encouraged to explore their creativity and develop new skills through after school clubs and classes. This year volunteer students and parents helped create clubs for sewing, knitting, piano, chess, soroban, dance, and newspaper.

SUMMER

Summers at FamilyPoint are full of amazing activities. In 2016 we offered 18 different Summer programs, ranging from American Sign Language to Sports Camp. An amazing 7 of our camps and programs were led by students or parents from our community.

Not only did students have the opportunity to learn and grow through arts, education, and sports programs, but FamilyPoint also focused on nutrition, partnering with Brighter Bites, the Houston Department of Parks and Recreation, and a number of area churches to tackle hunger issues in our community by providing breakfasts, lunches, free produce, and nutrition classes.

We also partnered with Ozark For All to send three charter buses of students to Camp Ozark, in Mt. Ida, Arkansas, for an amazing week of camp.

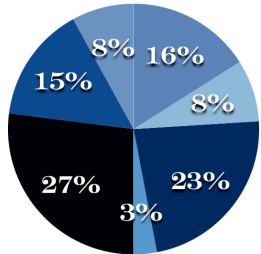

2015 Distribution of Income



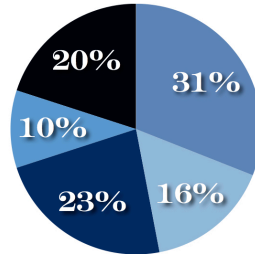
